Scott Golden has been involved in Tennessee politics since the late 1990's. He began as a West Tennessee Field Director for the Tennessee Republican Party. He then worked in New Hampshire on the Steve Forbes for President campaign. Moving back to West Tennessee, Golden was the Field Director for Van Hilleary for Governor. In 2003, he began in the office of Congressman Marsha Blackburn as a Field Representative, moving to District Director then Deputy Chief of Staff. Golden then worked as Deputy Chief of Staff for Congressman Stephen Fincher until being elected Chairman of the Tennessee Republican Party.

Outside of work, Golden has been a volunteer member of the State Executive Committee since 2007 represent-



ing the 27th State Senate District. He has also attended the 2008 and 2012 Republican National Conventions as a member of the Tennessee Delegation. In 2010, Golden was the Madison County Republican Party Man of the Year and in 2016 won the Tennessee Republican Party Statesman of the Year Award for the 8th Congressional District.

Scott Golden received a BS in Political Science from the University of Lambuth and a MA in Political Science from the University of Rhode Island. He has been married to his wife Christie for 14 years. They have three children, Ela, Kipi and Andrew. He is a member of Fellowship Bible Church in Jackson, TN.

With the 110th General Assembly behind us, it's time to look toward the 111th! Tennessee's House has 99 members and there are 25 open seats- meaning the Representative in that seat has resigned, is not running again, or is running for another

office. In the Senate, 7 of the 33 seats are open (though more Senate seats are likely to become open over the next few months).

What does this mean for the Montgomery County Republican Women? A busy summer!

You've heard the adage from our State President Barbara Trautman - Republicans who stay home elect Democrats. It's true! I'd like to add another – Republicans who aren't enthusiastic about their candidates help elect Democrats. With such large numbers of open seats in the Tennessee General Assembly, and many more elected officials with strong primary opponents this fall, we'll need to roll up our sleeves and help where we can to keep Tennessee's legislative branch red.

Also, we have candidates for the State Primary who have opposition and it is important that we get them elected in November. It's not too early right now to start working for them.

Of course, we cannot forget about our candidates who will be running in the November election for United States Senate and United States Congress.

You can go to almost any outdoor produce vendor and find fresh strawberries in May and June. So, we decided to share a Fresh Strawberry Pie recipe from our cookbook. Enjoy!



From our Cookbook ...

Fresh Strawberry Pie

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6 cups strawberries, about 1-/12 quarts 1 cup sugar 3 tablespoons cornstarch 1/2 cup water Red food coloring 1 (3-ounce) package cream cheese, softened 1 (9-inch) pie shell

BAKE and COOL the pie shell. Mash enough berries to measure 1 cup. Make a berry mixture by stirring together sugar and cornstarch in a saucepan. Gradually stir water and crushed berries into saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Continue to boil while stirring for 1 minute. Add a few drops of red food coloring. Let cool. Beat cream cheese until smooth; spread on bottom of cooled pie crust. Fill pie crust with the remaining berries. Pour berry mixture over the top. Chill at least 3 hours until set.

How did strawberries get their name?

There are many explanations about how this luscious fruit became known as the strawberry. The most common is that children in England during the nineteenth century threaded the berries onto straw and offered them for sale. Another theory is the name was derived from the nineteenth-century practice of placing straw around the growing berry plants to protect the ripening fruit.

The explanation which is widely thought to be correct is that the name originated a thousand years ago because of the plant's production of runners which spread outward from the plant. Thus, the word strawberry was derived from the Anglo-Saxon verb to strew (spread) and so the fruit became known as streabergan to the Anglo-Saxons and later, straberry, streberie, straibery, strauberry, and finally strawberry to the English.
